Yevgeny Victorovich Prigozhin was the head of the Wagner Group, a Russian paramilitary organization.⁴ Known as “Putin’s Chef,” Prigozhin rose rapidly from working as an ex-convict hotdog seller in 1990 to serving as the Kremlin’s primary source of catering and dining by 1999.⁵ In 2013, Prigozhin became the financier of the Internet Research Agency, now infamous for its interference in U.S. elections.⁶ An oligarch, Prigozhin owned or was linked to hundreds of companies, predominantly in construction, hydrocarbon extraction, media production, catering, and restaurants.⁷ As the leader of the Wagner Group and associated troll farms, Prigozhin played a significant role in Russia’s invasion of Ukraine, as well as in conflicts in Syria, Libya, Sudan, Mali, and the Central African Republic (CAR), among other countries.⁸

Prigozhin was born on June 1, 1961, in St. Petersburg, Russia, in what was then the Soviet Union. In 1977, he graduated from a sports-oriented boarding school.⁹ In 1980, he was sentenced to 13 years in prison for violent robbery and fraud and was released after a decade. In 1990, he opened a hot dog stand with his stepfather in St. Petersburg.¹⁰ Five years later, in 1995, Prigozhin opened his first fine dining restaurant, the Old Customs House, and created the company with which he would remain closely associated until his death: Concord.¹¹ In 1997, he opened another restaurant, the New Island, that would go on to serve celebrities and politicians.¹² Between 1999 and 2002, Prigozhin hosted Russian Prime Minister Stepashin and Head of the International Monetary Fund Michel Camdessus,¹³ Russian President Vladimir Putin and Japanese Prime Minister Yoshiro Mori,¹⁴ and Putin and U.S. President George W. Bush.¹⁵ Over time, Prigozhin’s business interests expanded. In 2013, he founded the Internet Research Agency, which carried out influence operations, including attempting to interfere with the 2016 U.S. presidential election.¹⁶ He held many limited liability company (LLC) registrations pertaining to construction projects, including Investotel, RITM, and Russian Empire. Prigozhin’s wife, three children, mother, and stepfather—Lyubov Prigozhina (1970), Polina Prigozhina (1992), Pavel Prigozhin (1998), Veronika Prigozhina (2005), Violetta Prigozhina (1939), and Samuel Zharkoy (1932)—were also registered with various companies tied to Prigozhin, many of which have been sanctioned.¹⁷

From 2014 to 2023, Prigozhin oversaw the expansion and transformation of the Wagner Group into a potent global paramilitary force.¹⁸ Initially deployed as combatants and enforcers in Ukraine following Russia’s annexation of Crimea, the group’s operations rapidly expanded globally. Wagner Group forces played a crucial role in supporting Syrian dictator Bashar al-Assad’s regime and subsequently established a presence in countries like Sudan, the CAR, and Libya. In these nations, Wagner provided security and training, facilitated resource extraction, delivered weapons as part of military-technical agreements, and advanced Russia’s global interests. The group became known for its brutal tactics, symbolized by a sledgehammer, a reference to the recorded torture and murder of a Syrian nation in 2017.¹⁹ Wagner forces returned to Ukraine in March 2022 to support Moscow’s war effort, mobilizing desperately needed manpower and successfully capturing cities such as Soledar and Bakhmut, albeit at tremendous human cost. As Prigozhin’s visibility and influence grew, he feuded publicly with the leadership of Russia’s Ministry of Defense, culminating in a short-lived mutiny in June 2023, during which Wagner forces seized key buildings in the city of Rostov-on-Don and marched on Moscow. Two months later, Prigozhin died in a plane crash under mysterious circumstances, leaving behind a complex legacy of mercenary operations and geopolitical intrigue.²⁰

Prigozhin’s son, Pavel, inherited the majority of the family’s companies and assets. Despite Prigozhin’s death, many of his entities remain under sanctions imposed by the United States, the European Union, the United Kingdom, Australia, New Zealand, Ukraine, and Japan.²¹

POLITICAL PARTIES

Prigozhin claims that during the August 1991 putsch, he was on the side of the opponents of the State Emergency Committee and personally overturned trolley buses in the square “so as not to return the USSR.” In October 2022, against the backdrop of events in Ukraine, he sided with Ramzan Kadyrov and criticized the commander of the Central Military District, Colonel General Aleksander Lapin.

In the fall of 2022, Yevgeny Prigozhin admitted that he interfered in the midterm elections of the U.S. Congress and will continue to do so. At the same time, he began to increasingly appear in Russia’s public sphere as the head of the Wagner Group, criticizing the actions of some leaders of the Ministry of Defense and Sergei Shoigu personally.

Prigozhin, without mincing words, criticized the decisions of the country’s top leadership, but he never mentioned the name of the president in heated statements. Prigozhin later said that in 2019, he invested 2 billion rubles in the election campaign of the mayor of St. Petersburg, Alexander Beglov. At the same time, he criticized Beglov and even accused him of preventing candidates close to Prigozhin from registering to participate in the parliamentary elections.

Sanctioned under E.O. 13661 on December 20, 2016.

Reason statement: “Yevgeny Prigozhin is being designated under E.O. 13661 for having materially assisted, sponsored, or provided financial, material, or technological support for, or goods or services in support of, senior officials of the Russian Federation. Prigozhin has extensive business dealings with the Russian Federation Ministry of Defense, and a company with significant ties to him holds a contract to build a military base near the Russian Federation border with Ukraine. Russia has been building additional military bases near the Ukrainian border and has used these bases as staging points for deploying soldiers into Ukraine.”⁸⁷

Sanctioned under E.O. 13694 on March 15, 2018.

Reason statement: “Yevgeny Victorovich Prigozhin provided material assistance to the IRA. Specifically, Prigozhin funded the operations of the IRA. OFAC previously designated Prigozhin under E.O. 13661, ‘Blocking Property of Additional Persons Contributing to the Situation in Ukraine.’”⁸⁸

Sanctioned by the Department of State under CAATSA Section 231 on September 20, 2018.

Reason statement: “Today, the President issued a new Executive Order “Authorizing the Implementation of Certain Sanctions Set Forth in the Countering Americas Adversaries Through Sanctions Act” to further the implementation of certain sanctions in the Countering America’s Adversaries Through Sanctions Act of 2017 (CAATSA) with respect to the Russian Federation. In addition, the Secretary of State is taking two actions today to implement his delegated authorities pursuant to section 231 of CAATSA and to further impose costs on the Russian Government for its malign activities. First, the Secretary of State added 33 additional persons – a person is either an entity or an individual – to the CAATSA section 231 List of Specified Persons (LSP) for being a part of, or operating for or on behalf of, the defense or intelligence sectors of the Government of the Russian Federation. This action increases the number of persons identified on the LSP to 72. Any person who knowingly engages in a significant transaction with any of these persons is subject to mandatory sanctions under CAATSA section 231.”⁸⁹

Sanctioned under E.O. 13848 on September 30, 2019.

Reason statement: “In renewed action, the Treasury Department is increasing its pressure against Yevgeny Prigozhin (Prigozhin) by not only calling out his support for the Internet Research Agency in connection with its efforts to interfere in the 2018 U.S. midterm elections, but also identifying his personal property, including several private jets and a yacht. Prigozhin has spent significant funds to further the Internet Research Agency’s attempted influence operations in connection with the 2018 U.S. midterm elections. As a result, Prigozhin is being designated pursuant to E.O. 13848 for materially assisting and providing financial support to the Internet Research Agency in connection with the 2018 U.S. midterm elections.”⁹⁰

Sanctioned on March 3, 2022, under E.O. 14024 and Russian Harmful Foreign Activities Sanctions (RUHSR).

Reason statement: “Today, OFAC is designating Prigozhin again pursuant to E.O. 14024 and the RuHSR for being responsible for or complicit in, or for having directly or indirectly engaged or attempted to engage in interference in a United States or other foreign government election for or on behalf of, or for the

the benefit of, directly or indirectly, the GoR. Lyubov, Polina, and Pavel are each being designated pursuant to E.O. 14024 and the RuHSR for being the spouse or adult child of Prigozhin, a person whose property and interests in property are blocked pursuant to E.O. 14024. Pavel also controls three companies, Lakhta Park, OOO, Lakhta Park Premium, OOO and Lakhta Plaza, OOO. These three companies are being designated pursuant to E.O. 14024 for being owned or controlled by, or for having acted or purported to act for or on behalf of, directly or indirectly, Pavel, a person whose property and interests in property are blocked pursuant to E.O. 14024. The EU, Canada, United Kingdom, and Australia have also designated Prigozhin. The EU and Canada have also designated Lyubov, and Canada has designated Polina and Pavel. The actions above were taken pursuant to E.O. 14024 and the RuHSR, which authorizes sanctions against Russia for its harmful foreign activities, including violating well-established principles of international law such as respect for the sovereignty and territorial integrity of other states.”⁹¹

Reason statement: “Yevgeniy Viktorovich Prigozhin is or has been involved in activities which threaten the peace, stability and security of Libya or undermine its transition to a democratic, peaceful and independent country, through his responsibility and provision of support for the activities in Libya of the organisation known as the Wagner Group. The Wagner Group is a Russia-based private military company but its organisation is purposely opaque to obscure its ownership and in order to provide a deniable military capability for the Russian State. The Wagner Group is or has been operating in Libya in contravention of the United Nations arms embargo established by United Nations Security Council Resolution 1970 (2011) and, through its activities in Libya in support of Khalifa Haftar’s Libyan National Army, threatens the peace, stability and security of Libya or undermines its transition to a democratic, peaceful and independent country.”⁹⁴

UKRAINE Sanctioned under the Special Economic Measures Act (SEMA), measures against Russia on February 24, 2022.
